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
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WELCOME TO THE BBC PROMS 2006

ARTIST BIOGRAPHY



SIR SIMON RATTLE conductor

Sir Simon Rattle was born in Liverpool in 1955 and, after studies at the Royal Academy of Music, won the 1974 John Player International Conducting Competition. He subsequently held a number of titles with British orchestras and was Principal Guest Conductor of the Rotterdam Philharmonic Orchestra. He became Principal Conductor and Artistic Advisor of

the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra in 1980, and was Music Director from 1990 to 1998. He has been Principal Guest Conductor of the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment since 1992, and is Founding Patron of Birmingham Contemporary Music Group. In September 2002 he became Chief Conductor and Artistic Director of the Berliner Philharmoniker.

The past season has included a tour of Asia with the Berliner Philharmoniker and short residencies at the Concertgebouw, Amsterdam, and Carnegie Hall. Sir Simon has also spent three weeks working with The Philadelphia Orchestra and led a European tour with the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment. He conducted a new production of Debussy's *Pelléas et Mélisande* at the Salzburg Easter Festival while at this summer's Aix-en-Provence festival he unveiled the first instalment of a *Ring* cycle. Next season will include work with the Rotterdam Philharmonic Orchestra, extensive touring with the Berliner Philharmoniker, *Das Rheingold* at Salzburg, *Die Walküre* at Aix and *Pelléas et Mélisande* for the Royal Opera, Covent Garden.

He has an extensive discography, the most recent additions being Debussy's La mer, Messiaen's Éclairs sur l'au-delà, Schubert's Symphony No. 9, Dvořák tonepoems, Orff's Carmina burana and Holst's The Planets, combined with a specially commissioned series of companion pieces, all with the Berliner Philharmoniker. Other notable recent releases include a Beethoven symphony cycle with the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra and Mahler's Symphony No. 8 with the CBSO. Simon Rattle was appointed CBE in 1987 and made a Knight Bachelor in 1994.

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Orchestra Biography

BERLINER PHILHARMONIKER

The Berliner Philharmoniker has been a feature of Berlin's musical life since its creation in 1882. Its first regular conductor was Hans von Bülow; guest conductors from this time included Hermann Levi, Hans Richter, Hans Pfitzner, Brahms, Grieg, Mahler and Strauss. Arthur Nikisch followed von Bülow in 1895, championing the music of Bruckner, Berlioz, Liszt, Tchaikovsky and 'modern' works by Strauss and Mahler. Nikisch was succeeded in 1922 by Wilhelm Furtwängler, who led the orchestra through the Nazi period, and in 1946 rejoined them in a Berlin that had been reduced to rubble. Sergiu Celibidache became the orchestra's first post-war permanent conductor. Furtwängler became Principal Conductor again in 1952; after his death two years later Herbert von Karajan became Permanent Conductor and Artistic Director. When Karajan stepped down, shortly before his death in 1989, Claudio Abbado became the fifth Artistic Director from the 1990/91 season: Sir Simon Rattle succeeded him and became the orchestra's first British Chief Conductor and Artistic Director from the 2002/3 season.

The orchestra's change of status to a charitable foundation (the Stiftung Berliner Philharmoniker) has created new opportunities and ensured its economic future. The foundation is supported by its principal sponsor, Deutsche Bank. Central to this support is the orchestra's education programme Zukunft@BPhil, which was set up by Rattle when he joined the orchestra, to ensure it reaches a broader and younger audience.
